



This also applies to reapplication for your child's junior school place when your child begins in Year 2

If you do not live within the borough you need to apply for a place through your own council and you can include Richmond schools in your application.

Admissions Criterion:

- 1. SEN* Place reserved for a child with an Education, Health and Care Plan
- 2. Looked after child (including previously looked after children)
- 3. Exceptional family, social or medical need
- 4. Having a brother or sister in the school or the paired school
- 5. Children of staff
- 6. Distance of home address to school

The closing date for applications is **15**th **January 2025**.





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
